like to cases of the typhoid fever - Mr Buck's eldest daughter - a very  
good girl member of the Church 14 years of age - who was at Blue-  
-hill when you was here - is now very sick of it - a week ago we  
hardly expected her life - but we hope now she is better -

I suppose you have heard that Enoch Bond died Sat' Morn'g  
his remains to day, <sup>widow</sup> and on the way to Georgetown to be interred  
his father & his wife attending them - He died in Faith -  
very happily - how short his period of labor - The remains  
were carried to Bangor Inds - & I suppose then were funeral  
services there yesterday - His wife sustains her loss with con-  
siderable composure -
