# **Portland Postal History**

# Cumberland County, Maine

First named Casco, the area was organized as the Town of Falmouth, under control of the Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1658. Abandoned in 1689 in the midst of war, it was resettled, and then re-incorporated in 1718. The section known as Falmouth Neck – now informally called "The Peninsula" -- separated and became the Town of Portland in 1786, and ultimately the City of Portland in 1833.

The bounds of the City grew dramatically in 1899 when Portland annexed the entire City of Deering, which had occupied most of Portland's "Off-Peninsula" lands. Portland's boundaries have long included a number of Casco Bay islands, although Long Island successfully seceded and became its own town in 1993.

Portland has had the longest history of postal service of any community in Maine. Maine's first post office was opened under the name Falmouth by the British Post Office in 1764, under the administration of Benjamin Franklin, whose title at the time was Deputy Postmaster General for British America.

During Portland's history, there have been approximately seventy post offices. Note: There have been at least twelve more post offices -- administered under the main Portland Post Office and identified with a Portland name – in Cape Elizabeth, Falmouth, and South Portland. Examples include Portland Br. No. 15 (actually in Cape Elizabeth) and Portland Sub-Sta./Sta./Br. No. 12 (in South Portland). In this website, these offices are included under the towns in which they are located.

Briefly, the history of Portland's post offices is as follows:

- Allen's Corner Post Office opened on 17 May 1872 and closed on 12 March 1875. (Town was Deering at the time)
- 2. Cliff Island Post Office 28 December 1892 and is still operational.
- Cushing Island Station Portland Post Office opened on 1 June 1903 and closed on 1 May 1919.
- 4. <u>Deering</u> Post Office (formerly Stevens Plains Post Office) opened on 14 February 1882, closed on 30 June 1900, and was replaced by Portland Sub-Sta. No. 1. The town was Deering before 1899.
- 5. <u>Deering Centre</u> Post Office opened on 10 April 1889, closed on 24 October 1895, and was renamed Deering Center Post Office.


- Deering Center Post Office (formerly Deering Centre Post Office) opened on 24 October 1895, closed on 30 June 1900, and was replaced by Portland Sub-Sta. No. 2. The town was Deering before 1899
- 7. <u>Deering Center S Portland</u> Post Office (formerly Portland Sta. No. 6) opened about 2007 and closed about 2009. It was then changed to Jet Video S Portland, located at Jet Video, 199 Pleasant Ave.
- 8. <u>Diamond</u> Post Office opened on 24 May 1892 and closed on 31 August 1901. The summer office was located on Great Diamond Island.
- 9. <u>Downtown Sx Portland</u> Post Office (Formerly Pearl Street Sx Portland) opened on 15 October 1973 and is still operational.
- 10. <u>East Deering</u> Post Office opened on 15 April 1872, closed on 30 June 1900, and was replaced by Portland Sub-Sta. No. 3. The town was Deering before 1899.
- 11. Falmouth (1) Post Office opened in 1764 and closed on 4 July 1786. It was then changed to Portland.
- 12. Fort Levett S Portland Post Office opened on 16 April 1941 and closed on 1 April 1944 on Cushing Island.
- 13. <u>Fort McKinley S. Portland</u> Post Office opened on 1 July 1925 and closed on 31 December 1948. It was located on Great Diamond Island.
- 14. <u>Jet Video S Portland</u> Post Office (formerly Deering Center S Portland) opened in 2009 and closed on 31 July 2018 at Jet Video, 199 Pleasant Ave.
- 15. <u>Little Chebeague</u> Post Office opened on 1 July 1889 and closed on 20 November 1889. (The town is now Long Island (see Long Island), but it was Portland before 1993.)
- 16. Long Island Post Office opened on 25 February 1878 and closed on 18 December 1878. It reopened on 29 September 1884 and is still operational. The town was Portland before 1993. (See Long Island)
- 17. Mariner Post Office opened on 23 July 1907 and closed on 8 May 1942. A. Summer office that was located on Long Island. The town was Portland before 1993. (see Long Island)
- 18. Navy 104 S Portland Post Office opened before 3 October 1942 and closed about 1946—Fleet Post Office Postal Concentration Center for Overseas Mail.
- Navy 10305 S Portland Post Office (formerly Section Base S Portland) opened on 15
   March 1944 and closed on 15 August 1945. Navy Post Office for Naval Station Grand
   Trunk Pier; established as 10305 (NPO for Naval Frontier Base), modified to 10305 (NPO
   for Naval Station Grand Trunk Pier).
- 20. Navy Sx Portland Post Office opened on 1 May 1946 and closed on 31 March 1948.
- 21. North Deering Post Office opened on 26 February 1892, closed on 30 June 1900, and became Portland Sub-Sta. No. 4. The town was Deering before 1899
- 22. Northwest Carrier Ax Portland Post Office opened in 1993 and closed on 1 December 1995, when Rand Road Carrier Ax Portland replaced it.
- 23. Ottawa Post Office opened on 21 March 1898 and closed on 13 June 1899. It was located at Ottawa House on Cushing Island.
- 24. <u>Peak Island</u> Post Office opened on 22 March 1872 and closed on 14 July 1873, when it was renamed Peak's Island Post Office.

- 25. <u>Peak's Island</u> Post Office (formerly Peak Island Post Office) opened on 14 July 1873 and closed on 14 July 1893, when it was renamed Peak Island Post Office.
- 26. <u>Peak Island</u> Post Office (formerly Peak's Island Post Office) opened on 14 July 1893 and closed on 31 March 1913 when it was renamed Peak Island Sx Portland.
- 27. <u>Peak Island Sx Portland</u> Post Office (formerly Peak Island Post Office) open ed on 31 March 1913 and closed on 30 September 1960, when it was renamed Peaks Island Sx Portland Post Office.
- 28. <u>Peaks Island Sx Portland</u> Post Office (formerly Peak Island Sx Portland) opened on 1 October 1960 and is still operational.
- 29. <u>Pearl Street Sx Portland</u> Post Office (formerly Portland Sta. A Sx) opened on 21 January 1934 and closed on 15 October 1973 when it was changed to Downtown Sx Portland.
- 30. <u>Portland</u> Post Office (formerly Falmouth (1)) opened on 5 July 1786 and is still operational.
- 31. Portland Sta. A Sx (1) Post Office opened on 15 December 1921, closed on 20 January 1934, and became Pearl Street Sx Portland Post Office.
- 32. Portland Sta. A Sx (2) Post Office 1 November 1943 and is still operational.
- 33. Portland Sub-Sta./Sta. No. 1 Post Office (formerly Deering Post Office) opened on 2 July 1900 and closed in 1964/1981.
- 34. Portland Sub-Sta./Sta. No. 2 Post Office (formerly Deering Center Post Office) opened on 2 July 1900 and closed on 31 March 1948.
- 35. Portland Sta. No. 2 Post Office opened on 26 August 1963 and closed in 1964/1981.
- 36. Portland Sub-Sta./Sta. No. 3 Post Office (formerly East Deering Post Office) opened on 2 July 1900 and closed on 31 March 1948.
- 37. Portland Sta. No. 3 Post Office opened in 1964/1981 and closed in 1981/1993.
- 38. Portland Sub-Sta./Sta. No. 4 Post Office (formerly North Deering Post Office) opened on 2 July 1900 and closed on July 1934.
- 39. Portland Sub-Sta./Sta. No. 5 Post Office opened on 15 August 1900 and closed on 1 March 1908.
- 40. Portland Sta. No. 5 Post Office opened on 16 June 1911 and closed on 13 June 1964.
- 41. Portland Sub-Sta./Sta. No. 6 Post Office opened on 1 July 1901 and closed on 31 March 1948.
- 42. Portland Sta. No. 6 Post Office opened on 1 July 1948 and closed circa 2007.
- 43. Portland Sub-Sta./Sta. No. 7 Post Office opened on 1 July 1901 and closed on 30 June 1956
- 44. Portland Sub-Sta./Sta. No. 8 Post Office opened on 1 July 1901 and closed in 1981/1983.
- 45. <u>Portland Sub-Sta./Sta. No. 9</u> Post Office (formerly Stroudwater) opened on 1 July 1901 and closed in 1937.
- 46. Portland Sta. No. 11 Post Office opened in 1928/1935 and closed on 31 March 1948.
- 47. Portland Sta. No. 13 Post Office opened on 1 August 1907 and closed on 30 November 1937.
- 48. Portland Sta. No. 14 Post Office (formerly Trefethen Post Office) opened on 1 July 1913 and closed on July 1934.

- 49. Portland Sta. No. 15 Post Office opened on 16 April 1916 and closed on 30 September 1958.
- 50. Portland Sta. No. 16 Post Office opened on 1 October 1916 and closed on 31 March 1948.
- 51. Portland Sta. No. 17 Post Office opened on 16 September 1917 and closed on July 1934.
- 52. Portland Sta. No. 18 (1) Post Office opened on 1 May 1918 and closed on July 1934.
- 53. Portland Sta. No. 18 (2) Post Office opened on 1 July 1936 and closed on 1 October 1938.
- 54. Portland Sta. No. 19 Post Office opened on 16 April 1926 and closed on 31 March 1948.
- 55. Portland Sta. No. 20 Post Office opened on 1 December 1926 and closed on 31 March 1948.
- 56. Portland Sta. No. 21 Post Office opened on 1 December 1926 and closed on 31 August 1934.
- 57. Rand Road Carrier Ax Portland Post Office (formerly Northwest Carrier Ax Portland) opened on 2 December 1995 and closed on 17 March 2007.
- 58. Receiving Station S Portland Post Office opened on 1 October 1942 and closed on 31 December 1945.
- 59. <u>Section Base S Portland</u> Post Office opened on 15 August 1942 and closed on 15 March 1944 and Changed to Navy 10305 S Portland (Navy Post Office for Naval Frontier Base)
- 60. <u>Stevens Plains</u> Post Office opened on 21 March 1832 and closed on 14 February 1882. It was changed to Deering; Stevens' Plains and Steven's Plains have been seen.
- 61. <u>Stroudwater</u> Post Office opened on 13 December 1875, closed on 1 July 1901, and was replaced by Portland Sub-Sta. No. 9.
- 62. <u>Trefethen</u> Post Office opened on 18 April 1904 and closed on 31 March 1913. It was a summer office located on Peaks Island; it was replaced by Portland Sta. No. 14.
- 63. <u>U.S. Fleet Post Office S Portland</u> Post Office opened before 1943 and closed on 31 March 1946.
- 64. West End S Portland Post Office (formerly West End Sx Portland) opened on 21 January 1934 and closed on 15 September 1980. It was located at Steele's Drugstore, 947 Congress St.
- 65. West End Sx Portland Post Office opened on 1 March 1908, closed on 21 January 1934, and changed to West End S Portland Post Office at 309 Saint John St.
- 66. <u>Woodfords</u> Post Office opened on 24 January 1870 and closed on 30 June 1900 and changed to Woodfords Sx Portland
- 67. <u>Woodfords Sx Portland</u> Post Office (formerly Woodfords Post Office) opened on 2 July 1900 and closed on 21 January 1934 changed to Woodfords S Portland; Woodf'ds Sta. has been seen.
- 68. <u>Woodfords S Portland</u> Post Office (formerly Woodfords Sx Portland Post Office) opened on 21 January 1934 and closed on June 2014.


The 1891 Post Route Map of Maine shows eight post offices in what is now Portland: Deering, Deering Centre, East Deering, Long Island, Peaks Island, Portland, Stroudwater, and Woodfords. (Note that the map includes the Cumberland and Oxford Canal, which had been rendered obsolete by the railroad, and closed down operations a few years before.)


The 1903 Post Route Map of Maine reveals the effects of increased home delivery of the mail. Although there were only two mainland post offices shown (Portland and Woodfords Station) there were several numbered stations in operation, which typically do not appear on the Post Route Maps. Four island post offices are shown: Cliff Island, Cushing Island Station, Long Island, and Peak Island. (Source: Post Route Map of the State of Maine, 1903.

The 1942 Post Route Map of Maine shows mainland post offices at Pearl Street, Portland, West End, and Woodfords. It does not include several numbered stations which were in full operation at the time. On the islands there were offices at Cliff Island, Fort Levett, Fort KcKinley (on Great Diamond Island), Long Island, and Peak Island. The summer office at Mariner, on Long Island, is shown with a triangle symbol, reflecting its recent closure. (In addition, there were post offices in South Portland and at Cape Cottage (located in the Town of Cape Elizabeth) that were administratively attached to the Portland Post Office.)



Arthur W. Stevens became the Postmaster of the Cliff Island Post Office.



22 June 1926:

The circular postmark is 32 mm in diameter with a four-bar (A/3) killer.

Leland Merrill became the Postmaster of the Cliff Island Post Office.


Mary O. Merrill became the Acting Postmaster of the Cliff Island Post Office.

The circular postmark is 31.5 mm in diameter with a four-bar (F/2) killer. A similar postmark and killer dated 18 September 1970 is known.

Evelina M. Dyer became the Officer-In-Charge of the Cliff Island Post Office.

### 26 September 1998:

Evelina M. Dyer became the Postmaster of the Cliff Island Post Office.



30 December 2005: The circular postmark is 37 mm in diameter with a four-bar (G/1) killer.

### 30 July 2012:

Amy Lent became the Officer-In-Charge of the Cliff Island Post Office.

# 18 May 2013:

Amy Lent became the Postmaster of the Cliff Island Post Office.

#### 21 March 2024:

Cliff Island Post Office is still operational at 11 Sunset Rd: unit 1, Cliff Island, ME 04019 GPS 43° 41′ 50″ N 70° 06′ 21″ W.

# **Cushing Island Station Portland**

### 1 June 1903:

Cushing Island Station Portland opened. It was a summer office only. Postmarks that have been seen include Cush. Island Sta. Portland, Maine, and Cushing Island, Portland.



July 1915:

The circular postmark is 26 mm in diameter with a six-bar elliptical duplex/1 killer.

### 1 May 1919:

Cushing Island Station Portland closed. The actual last day of operation would have been 30 September 1918.

# **Deering**

#### 14 February 1882:

Deering Post Office (formerly Stevens Plains Post Office) opened.

# 25 July 1881:

Charles A. Hayden became the Postmaster of the Stevens Plains Post Office and remained as Postmaster when Stevens Plains Post Office was renamed Deering Post Office on 14 February 1882.



23 June 1882:

The outer circle of the double-ring circular postmark is 27.5 mm in diameter, and it has a serif print and a four-circle target killer.

#### 31 December 1883:

Cynthia M. Record became the Postmaster of the Deering Post Office.



28 October 1886:

The circular postmark is 25 mm in diameter with a serif print and a four-circle target killer. Similar postmarks and killers dated 9 July 1883, 1 January 1890, 2? February 1889 and 2 October 1889 are known.

### 9 May 1890:

Miss Sarah S. Morrill became the Postmaster of the Deering Post Office.

### 24 April 1894:

Honora J. Scanlon became the Postmaster of the Deering Post Office.



17 November 1899:

The circular postmark is 28.5 mm in diameter with a cork smudge killer. A similar postmark and killer dated 29 May 1900 is known.

### 16 January 1900:

George C. Roberts became the Postmaster of the Deering Post Office.

#### 30 June 1900:

Deering Post Office closed and was replaced by Portland Sub-Sta. No. 1.

# **Deering Centre**

### 10 April 1889:

Deering Centre Post Office opened.

#### 10 April 1889:

Charles S. Chadbourne became the Postmaster of the Deering Centre Post Office.

### 12 August 1891:

Charles C. Brown became the Postmaster of the Deering Centre Post Office.



21 May 1892:

The circular postmark is 27.5 mm in diameter with a four-circle target killer. A similar postmark and killer dated 9 July 1892 is known.

#### 24 October 1895:

Deering Centre Post Office closed and was renamed Deering Center Post Office.

# **Deering Center**

#### 24 October 1895:

Deering Center Post Office (formerly Deering Centre Post Office opened.

#### 24 October 1895:

Alexander A. McStone became the Postmaster of the Deering Center Post Office.



May 1897:

The circular postmark is 28.5 mm in diameter and features a quartered circle cork killer. A similar postmark with a smudged cork killer dated January 1899 is known.

Leander M. Clark became the Postmaster of the Deering Center Post Office.

#### 28 May 1900 discontinued effective 30 June 1900:

Deering Center Post Office closed and was replaced by Portland Sub-Sta. No. 2.

# **Deering Center S Portland**

#### Circa 2007:

Deering Center S Portland Post Office (formerly Portland Sta. No. 6) opened.



February 2009:

Deering Center S Portland before it changed its name to Jet Video-Photo Credit Kelvin Kindahl

### Circa 2009:

Deering Center S Portland Post Office closed, and the name changed to Jet Video S Portland.

# **Diamond**

### 24 May 1892:

Diamond Post Office opened. The Summer Office was located on Great Diamond Island.

### 24 May 1892:

Charles H. Ross became the Postmaster of Diamond Post Office.

# 13 August 1901 discontinued effective 31 August 1901:

Diamond Post Office closed with service from Portland.

#### **Downtown Sx Portland**

# 15 October 1973:

Downtown Sx Portland Post Office (Formerly Pearl Street Sx Portland) opened.

# **East Deering**

#### 15 April 1872:

East Deering Post Office opened.

#### 15 April 1872:

Osgood Knight became the Postmaster of the East Deering Post Office.

### 10 April 1882:


Hattie O. Knight became the Postmaster of the East Deering Post Office.

### 18 February 1886:

Emily Knight became the Postmaster of the East Deering Post Office.

### 15 September 1894:

Alvin Murray became the Postmaster of the East Deering Post Office.



1 October 1897: The circular postmark is 28 mm in diameter with a "D" killer.

28 May 1900 discontinued effective 30 June 1900:

East Deering Post Office closed and replaced by Portland Sub-Sta. No. 3.

**Falmouth (1)** (Note: There were two post offices in Maine named Falmouth at different times and locations. The (1) is just a notation. It does not appear in the postmarks and is only used by postal historians and collectors to differentiate between the different post offices.)

1764: (5 January 1764 per Mazza) (A Post Office apparently operated here as early as 1763, under the British. Thomas Child reportedly served as Postmaster from at least 1764 to 1773.)

Falmouth (1) Post Office opened.

1764:

Thomas Child became the Postmaster of Falmouth (1) Post Office.

### 12 May 1775:

Samuel Freeman became the Postmaster of Falmouth (1) Post Office. (the Massachusetts Provincial Congress appointed Samuel Freeman on May 12, 1775. Benjamin Franklin reappointed him on October 1, 1775.)

#### 4 July 1786:

Falmouth (1) Post Office closed and was renamed Portland Post Office.

#### **Fort Levett S Portland**

#### 16 April 1941:

Fort Levett S Portland Post Office opened. (Located on Cushing Island)

#### 1 April 1944:

Fort Levett S Portland Post Office closed.

# Fort McKinley S. Portland


### 1 July 1925:

Fort McKinley S. Portland opened. It was located on Great Diamond Island.



7 August 1925:

The circular postmark is 21 mm in diameter with a six-bar oval triplex/1 killer.



17 July 1938:

The circular postmark is 32 mm in diameter with a four-bar (F/1) killer.

#### 31 December 1948:

Fort McKinley S. Portland closed.

### Jet Video S Portland

2009:

Jet Video S Portland Post Office (formerly Deering Center S Portland) opened. It was located at Jet Video, 199 Pleasant Ave., Portland 04103. GPS 43° 40′ 27″ N 70° 17′ 42″ W.

Long Island Post Office opened. (see Long Island)

#### 18 December 1878:

Long Island Post Office closed.

#### 29 September 1884:

Long Island Post Office reopened.

#### 29 September 1884:

Thomas M. Glendenning became the Postmaster of the Long Island Post Office.

#### 1 September 1893:


John W. Hughey became the Postmaster of the Long Island Post Office.

#### 10 April 1895:

31 July 1905:


The circular postmark is 29 mm in diameter with a Doane 2/3 killer. A similar postmark and killer dated 24 August 1907 is known.

Henry J. Clarke became the Postmaster of the Long Island Post Office.



22 August 1910:

The circular postmark is 30 mm in diameter with a four-bar (A/2) killer.

#### 12 January 1923:

Everett E. Clarke became the Acting Postmaster of the Long Island Post Office.

#### 19 March 1923:

Everett E. Clarke became the Postmaster of the Long Island Post Office.



9 June 1942: The circular postmark is 35 mm in diameter with a four-bar (C/1) killer.

#### 1 July 1944:

Long Island Post Office became a Presidential Post Office.



22 June 1950:

The circular postmark is 30 mm in diameter with an eight-bar Duplex/1 killer. A similar postmark and killer dated 4 January 1961 is known.

#### 30 April 1964:




